Covid 19 - Level Two






Paula writes:

Today is a day of celebrations. We celebrate Val Hawkins turning 90!!! And Rodney and Val Judd celebrating 60 years of marriage. What amazing milestones. We honour you and celebrate with you. Thank you for being faithful Jesus followers and examples, and for all you are to this church family.

In uncertain times, it is good to still have things to celebrate even if we have to find creative ways of doing so. Many of us have had significant gatherings and events cancelled or postponed, yet we find ways to stay connected, and celebrate. I was part of a significant prayer gathering this last week with others from another region, even though I could only "zoom" in. Let's continue to pray for wisdom for our leaders, inspiration for those in the Health fields developing vaccines and solutions, and for those hot spots in the world where the Virus is taking lives.

This week we take another look at the referendum issues coming up in the election: The End of Life Choice referendum and the Cannabis Legislation and Control Referendum. A month ago I spoke on the first one, aiming to give a biblical mandate for the sanctity of life, challenging the assumption that we have right to die, affirming the value of good palliative care which doesn't mean

prolonging life at all costs, and mentioning some of the huge risks and societal effect if we were to legalise euthanasia, especially on the vulnerable and disabled in our community, those who perhaps need the most care. The Cannabis referendum also contains huge dangers. Marijuana use has terrible effects on mental health, physical health (affecting the lungs like smoking), brain function, and it is a gateway drug. Yes, there are some medicinal uses – but these are already available. This legislation is incredibly dangerous.

Today, to address these two issues I have invited James Carstens and Nona Aston, both as experts in their fields, to answer some questions around the two referendums. My hope and prayer is that each of us would take significant care in how we vote on these issues and also take opportunities to respectfully engage in as many conversations as possible before the election.

The good news in all of this is that our confidence is in God, the Maker of heaven and earth. And although our country faces many challenges, we are called to respectfully fight for justice and truth and do all we can to be agents of good news and life.
