



Paula writes...

Today we begin a teaching series on the Holy Spirit. Frank is starting us off with looking at the Holy Spirit in Paul's letter to the Ephesians. I think a helpful description of the Holy Spirit is **God's Empowering Presence.**

In my reading this week, I discovered this description of the different ways we think of or experience this power and presence in our lives, and how it relates to how we most think of Jesus.

Lynne Baab writes: "Some Christians see Jesus, first and foremost, as a wise and insightful



teacher, and those Christians seem to view the Holy Spirit, first and foremost, as a supernatural source of wisdom, insight and guidance, giving them the power to live wisely. Other Christians see Jesus most clearly as a lover of all people, even the most marginalized and outcast, and those Christians seem to expect the Holy Spirit to give them power from God to love and care across boundaries and in difficult and challenging situations. Yet others, when they look at the way Jesus is described in the Gospels, first see a powerful healer, and they expect the Holy Spirit to come into human life with abundant and dramatic power to heal. In my experience, those three views of the Holy Spirit are the most common, but there are others. If one views Jesus primarily as a holy and pure man with exacting standards, then the Holy Spirit might be experienced mostly as one who rebukes and convicts of sin. The power to see our sin is important, but must be balanced by Jesus' grace and mercy. As the wider culture becomes more secular, an increasingly significant view of the Holy Spirit relates to Jesus as the one sent by God into the world to do God's mission. In this view, the Holy Spirit is God's presence with us to send us into the world with the power to engage in God's priorities.

Surely all five of these views of Jesus and the Holy Spirit can be supported by the Bible: wise guide, lover, healer, one who convicts of sin, and sender into mission. I would argue that all five are relevant and helpful when thinking about Jesus and the Holy Spirit."

I know I long for the Holy Spirit to be active in all these ways in me and through me. As I start each new day, I am given courage by the fact God's Spirit is alive in me, leading, guiding, comforting, challenging, empowering so I can be the Jesus person I am called to be, and that the Spirit can work through me in ways beyond anything I could do.

Frank Darcy is sharing with us this morning on the Holy Spirit. He writes,

Eph. 4:15 – "We should always speak the truth in love. Then we will grow in every way and be more like Christ."

Bob Gass comments on this verse: "Don't use words such as 'love' and 'transparency' to disguise a judgmental attitude. People get screamed at, chewed out and verbally abused in the name of love. Don't vent your anger at someone in the name of honesty. You should always confront with reluctance, never with eagerness. You should confront directly, yet gently, and always with a desire to bring about God's best in the other person's life. At all points, the listener should never be in doubt as to your love and acceptance."

Today, I will be speaking from Ephesians about the work of the Holy Spirit in the life of believers, and in the life of the church. One commentator has described Ephesians as "a liturgy for Pentecost."
